Circle May 10 and 11 on your calendar so you don't miss the Midwest Chapter's annual plant sale and truss show at the Chicago Botanic Garden (CBG). The sale begins at 9:00 AM.

As last year, our event will fall on Mother's Day weekend. This is one of the busiest weekends at the CBG and we're hoping to have the same high level of traffic as we had last year.

John Honkisz, plant sale coordinator, has selected a wonderful assortment of plants for our sale. When selecting, John's goal was to choose as many hardy varieties as possible that will be in bloom for the sale. We have found these are the plants that are most attractive to visitors and sell the quickest.

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Cash or Credit? Another new feature that is being added this year is the ability to charge your purchase. In the past, we have been asked if we accept credit cards and since we didn't, we believe we lost some sales. We are now able to accept Visa or Mastercard and It will be interesting to see how accepting credit cards affects sales.

Once again our rhododendrons are coming from Rosebay Nursery in Saugatuck, Michigan, and John Migas will provide some evergreen azaleas from his

nursery. Approximately 25 to 30 varieties are on order and some are in quantities of only three or four, so if there is something on the list that you are looking for, please come to the sale early.

We are always in need of volunteers and if any of you can help out that weekend, please contact John Honkisz <johonkisz@comcast.net>. We generally need people to help set up on Friday and tear the show down on Sunday afternoon.

In addition to the plant sale, our chapter will have its annual truss show which is always a big attraction for our visitors. Many people are amazed by the wide variety of plants we grow in the Midwest and after seeing our display become interested in growing rhododendrons themselves.

We encourage all of our members to take part in the truss show. We have all of the display props so all you have to do is bring your flower trusses. We ask that you arrive with your trusses about 8:30 AM on Saturday morning so we have enough time to set up the display before the sale begins.

The truss show is not a competition but a way to showcase beautiful rhododendron and azalea blooms for our visitors to enjoy up close.

The plant sale and truss show is the most important event our chapter holds and is our primary fund raising event. We urge all to attend, bring some friends and pick up a wonderful rhododendron, perhaps for a Mother's Day gift.
