

The Midwest Chapter's annual plant sale and truss show will take place on Mothers Day weekend, May 9 and 10 at The Chicago Botanic Garden (CBG) in Glencoe, Illinois. Hours are between 10:00 AM and 4:00 PM each day.

Mother's Day weekend is one of the busiest at The CBG so we're anticipating a large turnout from what we experienced last year. We once again will accept credit cards which we feel greatly helped our sales last year.

We encourage all members to participate in the truss show as it helps acquaint visitors with the diversity of rhododendrons and azaleas we grow in our Midwest gardens. If you plan to participate, arrive prior to 10:00 AM to allow enough time to place your trusses in the provided vases and prepare name cards for each

John Honkisz, our plant sale coordinator, has once again selected a nice variety of rhododendron cultivars from Rosebay Nursery in Michigan. Refer to the list of varieties that were ordered, but as always, there may be substitutions due to availability. Also, some of the varieties

are in limited quantities so arrive at the sale early for best selection.

John Migas will once again provide a variety of evergreen azaleas for our sale from his nursery in Saugatuck, Michigan. John once again volunteered to deliver the plants from Rosebay to The CBG on Friday, May 8.

If by chance you need a large order of plants, contact John Honkisz at 708-499-0542, jhonkisz@yahoo.com to see if he can preorder them for you and have them held at the sale. All preorders must be purchased by whoever places the order and the price will be determined at the sale based on size and variety. Last year's prices where in the \$35-\$45 range.

We always need volunteers to set up the plant sale on Friday and close the show out on Sunday. If you can help out, contact John Honkisz.

The plant sale is our only event to raise revenue for our chapter's programs so we ask for all of our members support. Bring some friends and take home a new rhododendron. What a perfect Mother's Day gift!

# Letter

**FRED STANTON** 

Following in my grandparents' and parents' footsteps, I gradually became a gardener in the middle 1960s. Early endeavors were helping my parents with a vegetable garden and observing my father's efforts to landscape our yard. I was mildly disappointed when nearly all of the deciduous plants and trees became bare and there were no longer any leaves on the plants. One day in driving around Monmouth, I observed a large green-leafed plant in the midst of winter and thought that it was very impressive and incredible in that it kept its leaves all winter. It wasn't long before I planted four new Rhododendrons southeast of our house under a spreading Sugar Maple. Two of the four slowly died and the remaining two survived and became quite large as the years went by. One of the plants is Ignatius Sargent and the other is Roseum Elegans.

As the years went by my enthusiasm increased as did my experimenting in growing many different Rhododendron varieties along with deciduous Azaleas. Early on I realized that nearly all evergreen Azaleas don't survive in our winters, but several of the Deciduous Azaleas grew to heights of 15 feet tall and 10 feet across and were spectacular when in bloom.

At some point in the early 1980s I learned about the Midwest Chapter of the American Rhododendron Society and that they met at the Chicago Botanical Garden on the north edge of Glencoe, IL. I was delighted in finding the Rhododendron enthusiasts, sharing our experiences in growing Rhododendrons and our successes and failures, comparing notes on old and new varieties and becoming friends through the years.

As some of you know, there are a number of us that are still members of our chapter since the early days. Many of the members we have acquired over the past twenty-five years have become dedicated members and some have gone on their way. As with most organizations, membership is difficult to maintain or to increase in recent years. Perhaps with the downturn in our economy, we will see a greater interest in gardening and growing such premier plants as the Rhododendrons and Azaleas.

The coming spring will undoubtedly reflect our disappointment in the loss of some bloom, but I hope that overall our 'ironclads' and hardier varieties will still present us with their beautiful compliment of blooms to our spring season.

Hope to see many of you at our plant sale Mother's Day weekend, May 9th and 10th!

Vireyas From The Land Down Under

On October 10, 2008, we were fortunate to have Kaye Hagen, a Vireya expert from Tasmania and past president of The Australian Rhododendron Society address our chapter. Her presentation was about Vireyas which she grows at her home in Hobart, Tasmania.

Kaye's presentation included an overview of the growing conditions in her garden and the cultural requirements needed to grow these colorful plants.

The average temperatures in Hobart are between 50°F and 70°F with only approximately 24" of annual rainfall. Temperatures rarely exceed 95°F and the record low is +19°F.

Her presentation featured many beautiful photos of her plants that include a plethora of vibrant colors. reds, yellows oranges, pinks, bi-colors and so forth. In addition to their wonderful colors, vireyas have a beautiful fragrance.


It was interesting to learn some vireyas bloom three times a year so she has plants in bloom literally all year long. Also, some varieties exhibit a color shift depending which season they are in bloom which adds to their interest.

Commencing at 2 o'clock on February 22, 2009, three members of the Midwest Chapter of the A.R.S. made presentations for the benefit of Chicago Botanical Garden members and for chapter members.



The first presentation was by John Golab, a long time member of our chapter (25 plus years) and who has served as chapter president several times. John showed pictures of many of his showy Rhododendrons that he has grown in his yard in Barrington, IL, giving information relative to the color of the flowers and hardiness of some of the plants, He expressed our concern for the spring, 2009 flowering season, knowing that some of our plants will have experienced bud blast (ruination of the flowers by the extreme cold experienced during January, 2009). John also discussed the differences between lepidotes (small leafed) and elepidotes (large leafed) Rhododendrons and variation of their shade requirements according to the variety.

The second presentation was by John Honkisz, who is a fairly recent member of our chapter, but has shown great interest in growing rhododendrons and azaleas. John gave an in depth discussion of the proper types of soil to use in which to successfully grow Rhododendrons. John also elaborated on not only the proper chemical combination that affords the most amenable soil in which the Rhododendron thrive, but also the actual source of those acidic, aerating, fast draining materials.

The last presentation was by Fred Stanton who showed his pictures of Kew Gardens taken in late April, early May of 2007. It turned out to be one of the best times to see a majority of the Rhododendrons and Azaleas in full bloom as the photos revealed. The venerable 150 plus year old Rhododendrons that were planted at Kew Gardens in the 1800s towered over 30 feet tall! Hard to believe that some of our varieties will actually become that large, if they live that long. Fred does have several large Rhododendrons in his yard that are nearly 40 years old and at least 12 feet tall, probably not too bad considering our extreme Illinois weather.
